Plenary Sessions

TeamBirth: Process Innovation for Safety, Effective Communication, and Dignity in Childbirth This session will introduce the TeamBirth model that is being implemented in hundreds of hospitals around the country. The speaker will provide background on the "why" behind TeamBirth, review of the core components and key behaviors of TeamBirth, examination of the research involving TeamBirth, and a call to action for clinicians.

Infant and Maternal Mortality Updates

New York State Pregnancy-Associated Mortality for 2018 – 2020 and Infant Mortality from 2016-2019 will be reviewed. The presentation will focus on trends in mortality, racial disparities, causes of death, risk factors and contributing factors associated with death, and geographic differences where available. Discussion of Key Recommendations to prevent future maternal deaths will be presented as well as what NYS is doing to address maternal and infant mortality.

Substance Use in the Perinatal Period: Harnessing Technology to Address Barriers to Care – This presentation will provide an overview of the state of the field of digital interventions for substance use and the potential of digital interventions to overcome barriers and fill gaps in care for pregnant and postpartum individuals who use substances. As case examples, we will discuss work done by Partnership to End Addiction to design digital interventions for substance use that are tailored to the unique needs of pregnant and postpartum people.

Updates on infectious Diseases Affecting Pregnancy – This session will provide evidence-based updates about infectious diseases affecting pregnancy, with a main focus on respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) vaccination. The RSV vaccine was quickly deployed in the 2023-2024 RSV season, and there is a need for more education regarding the illness and the vaccine for the general population, pregnant people and those who care for and support them. The presenters will review the decisionmaking process that pregnant people will face in choosing vaccination during pregnancy versus preventive antibodies for the neonate. Presenters will also provide an update and reminder on the current guidelines for screening, treatment and prevention of other infectious diseases in pregnancy including cytomegalovirus, HIV, syphilis, varicella, rubella and hepatitis. Centering Ourselves: De-radicalizing "Abortion as Healthcare" Discussions to Improve Perinatal Health Outcomes

In this session, the presenter will discuss the radicalization of abortion and related perinatal healthcare issues, and how this radicalization contributes to widening health disparities and further marginalization of oppressed segments of our communities. The stark impact of systemic radicalization on individual human lives, and on the rising rates of infant and maternal mortality and morbidity in the United States will also be discussed. The session will conclude with a discussion of the role of doulas' in the healthcare landscape, both in addressing health disparities in patient-facing roles in birth, postpartum, and bereavement, and also in combatting systemic challenges in policy-related settings such as local legislature and Medicaid.

NY Medicaid Maternal Health Policy Updates - This session will provide an overview of NY Medicaid maternal health policy updates from 2022-2024, to include presentation of the overarching Medicaid provider standards, updates to the State Plan, and new alternate payment programs. Explanations of new Medicaid coverage of community-based provider services, such as doula services, community health worker services, and nutrition counseling will be provided and next steps and future considerations will be discussed.

Black Perinatal Mental Health – Racial disparity in maternal health outcomes is a product of structural racism in the medical system and providers' implicit bias when providing care to Black birthing people. Providers often lack knowledge of strutural racism's impacts on the practice of medicine and the role of their own implicit biases in contributing to these outcomes. The emotional, psychological, and community impact of disparities in care for Black birthing people, as well as interactions with a racist medical system, contribute to the psychological and emotional distress experienced during the perinatal period. This session will improve knowledge on structural racism in medicine and the harmful impacts of implicit bias, and equip providers with perinatal mental health screening strategies for early identification of needs, and thus decrease the distress experienced by Black birthing individuals, their newborns, and their family systems.

Birthing Experiences Impacted by Bias and Communication – Community health workers are critical partners to many pregnant individuals, especially those of minority and impoverished status. Three Moms who have had negative experiences during their pregnancy and births will share their stories through video recording while the CHWs who worked with them will be present to add context to the clients' stories and explain their role in the case management of the clients. This session is designed to help providers gain a better understanding of how individuals perceived their care and birth experiences, and how we can do a better job of understanding and working with pregnant individuals to improve their care and experience.

Concurrent Sessions

NYS DOH: Closing the Gaps in the Congenital Syphilis Prevention Cascade: From Data to Action - This presentation will cover the current epidemiologic trends in congenital syphilis both nationally and within New York State as well as the most common missed prevention opportunities that lead to congenital syphilis. This will be presented through a health equity lens which will identify the social determinants of health and structural barriers that contribute to these outcomes and strategies to address them.

The Association of Perinatal Networks - panel

Is Cord Blood Banking Worth it in 2024?- This session will dive into the fascinating and advanced world of cord blood banking where the audience will touch points with the unique properties and benefits of umbilical cord blood banking. We will unfold the powers of the latest medical advancements and what the potential of cord tissue and placental stem cells is. Through a mix of engaging presentation and case studies, the audience will gain insights into the advantages of cord blood banking for individuals and families. They will learn about the differences between private and public banking and be able to make informed choices about potentially preserving their stem cells. The speaker will review the basics of cord blood banking to the more advanced and modern science behind it, providing examples of case studies for the impact of stem cells in patients with leukemia, hearing loss and even HIV. The session will conclude with a look into the exciting future of possibilities of potentially finding a cure to Type 1 Diabetes and many other, currently incurable diseases.

How Project TEACH Can Help Clinicians Meet the Mental Health Care Needs of Perinatal Patients – Through this session, attendees will learn about the consultative, education and referral/linkage services offered by New York State's Perinatal Psychiatry Access Program, Project TEACH. Project TEACH is funded by the New York State Office of Mental Health and supports a team of perinatal psychiatrists, psychologists and liaison coordinators to support NY-based clinicians meet the perinatal mental health needs of their patients. With the use of case examples, the Medical Director of Project TEACH will instruct attendees on the types of clinical consultations and referrals Project TEACH provides. Attendees will also learn about the no-cost CME-based trainings offered throughout the year for NY state clinicians and prescribers. Project TEACH can help improve provider assessment, a leading provider-based factor in mental health deaths in perinatal patients.

Improving Patient Safety Through Standardized Communication in Labor & Delivery – Emergency situations can evolve rapidly in the Labor and Delivery Unit. Appropriate interventions and a timely response are required by multi-disciplinary team members. Clear, concise, closed loop communication is critical to maintain Patient Safety. In highly acute, emergent situations, rapid recognition and response times may be delayed by poor communication between team members. Ineffective communication can have a serious impact on patient outcomes. The speakers will discuss the benefits of implementing standardized tools like checklists which can streamline the communication process and help guarantee that necessary information is conveyed and help the team appropriately prepare for situations.

NYS DOH: DOH Set-met Torch Infection -

Presentation to include information about New York State's perinatal infection surveillance system and common perinatal infections including: CMV, syphilis and hep C. Other topics will include vaccine and vector borne disease in pregnant people and infants.

Team Birth: Clinical Scenario Training - The format of this workshop is a review of the two core components and four key behaviors in TeamBirth huddles. Attendees will have the opportunity to practice filling out TeamBirth shared planning boards based on practice scenarios in clinical management.

The Doula Effect: Enhancing Outcomes for Birthing Families - This session will focus on how birth doulas can help foster comprehensive support for birthing families. As part of The Doula Partnership, a new 4-county program that helps connect community members of Cayuga, Cortland, Madison and Herkimer counties with no-cost birth doulas, their team of Cortland County doulas are challenging negative maternal and infant health trends by fostering a unique approach of individually tailored supportive care for both the birthing individual and their primary support person.

Implementing Overdose Prevention and Harm Reduction Strategies – Rates of overdose continue to rise, with annual overdose deaths surpassing 100,000 in 2021. The Community Overdose Prevention Education Project, or Project COPE, is a SAMSA -funded grant initiative that seeks to reduce rates of overdose death in New York by connecting to vulnerable, underserved populations such as pregnant and parenting persons. Join members of the Project COPE team in exploring the science of substance use and substance use disorders, the basics of overdose prevention and naloxone use, and concrete ways professionals outside of the substance use disorder treatment system can help prevent overdoses among the individuals and families they serve. concrete skills and interventions will be provided to increase overdose prevention knowledge for all who attend.

Voices of Hope and Healing: Parental Mental Health Peer Support for New York Families – Maternal mental health conditions primarily anxiety and depression are the most common complication of pregnancy and childbirth, impacting one in five birthing persons. This session will include discussion, some case studies and Q&A. The NYS Dept of Health, NYS Maternal Mortality Review Report on Pregnancy Associated Deaths in 2018 states the top three leading causes of pregnancy-related deaths in 2018 were embolism, hemorrhage and mental health conditions. All pregnancy-related deaths due to hemorrhage, mental health conditions and cardiomyopathy were determined to be preventable. Peer Support may be a protective factor in suicide. An emerging strategy that is critically important is the availability of providing parental mental health peer support from those with lived experience and including addressing racism, discrimination and social determinants of health. **Sonia Murdock, PMH-C**

The Dyad Works! The Perinatal Health Care Provider and the New Parent - Creating Parent Professional Partnerships to Impact the Outcome of the Newborn and Early Infant - This session will review a multidisciplinary Families for Families - Peer to Peer Model to scale, in which families connect with other families as well as perinatal health providers to enhance protective factors, risk mitigation for wellness mindedness to result in dissemination of knowledge around safety and survival, wellness through communication that will produce whole-mindedness by using the lens of resilience and hope to pull wisdom principles from the realm of shared experience. Perinatal healthcare providers use of universal design to reconfigure medical model into healing welcoming safe spaces that serve as community labs for shared experience for communicating strengths building and resilience promoting, through elevating hope that counteracts intergenerational trauma's hold on families with shared knowledge of evidence based best practice that as families together with perinatal healthcare providers, result in healthy outcomes for newborn babies.
