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#### PLENARY SESSION DESCRIPTIONS

#### Opening Keynote: Defining and Planning for the 4<sup>th</sup> Trimester

Through this opening session, Dr. Rosser will set the tone for the conference by providing a conversation about how postpartum care has been redefined to transform care for new mothers. Traditionally, women have been expected to attend a postpartum visit 6 weeks after delivery. There is poor attendance to these visits, especially among women in marginalized populations. Dr. Rosser will share revised recommendations for postpartum care from the American College of Obstetrics & Gynecology

#### The role of Community Health Workers in Caring for the Mother/Baby Diad in the 4th Trimester

Participants will learn about creative outreach and engagement strategies utilized by Community Health Workers (CHW), their work with high-risk newly parenting and intra-partum women, as well as the impact of social determinants of health on compliance with care for both mom and baby. This panel features 3 CHWs who will share the challenges and needs of women from urban, suburban and rural communities and strategies for engaging them in care.

#### NYS Dept. of Health Strategies & Regulatory Updates

The NYS Dept of Health, Division of Family Health has a strong focus on improving health outcomes of pregnant/parenting people and infants. During this session, Ms. Tobias will provide updates on some of the state's Maternal Mortality initiatives, including a learning collaborative to address birth equity, and an update on the Governor's COVID-19 Maternity Task force. Ms. Tobias will also provide a brief update on the perinatal hospital re-designation process.

#### Pandemic Experiences - reports from the field & strategies for moving forward

During this session, panelists will provide a brief review of processes put in place during the height of Covid-19 to reduce potential infection among pregnant women—prenatally and during delivery, and care of the newborn. They will then discuss lessons learned and how to use these experiences to protect moms and babies in the next phase of Covid and for future infectious outbreaks.

#### **Combatting Black Maternal & Infant Mortality**

This session will showcase a peer health intervention model to address maternal mortality through a multi-disciplinary and multi-faceted approach. Dr. Hackett will discuss their work to educate women on knowing rights during pregnancy and child-birth; prematurity risks; post-birth warning signs, as well as a provider component to improve prenatal care through best practices in respectful, culturally appropriate maternity care.

#### Postpartum Sexual Wellness (or is sex really how we got here?)

Through this session Dr. Kranz will discuss the physical, psychological, relational and cultural factors impacting post partum sexuality. She will identify common sexual concerns in the post partum period and review options for treatment of postpartum sexual concerns.

#### Moving on Maternal Depression

Schuyler Center for Analysis and Advocacy is leading a statewide collaborative to identify, prioritize, and advance changes in policy and practice that will increase screening and treatment for maternal depression in New York State. Through a panel format, this session will provide an overview of the data-driven, evidenced-based set of programs and policies that have been identified to help close the disparities gap. Panelists will provide brief overviews of the pilot programs being launched in various communities around the state.

#### First 1,000 Days on Medicaid

The First 1000 Days is a NYS Medicaid Initiative that recognizes that the first three years of a child's life can have a lasting impact on future health, educational achievement, and economic stability. It is a comprehensive pediatric health care model that integrates behavioral health into children's primary care and recommends a two-generational approach to care, focusing on both the biomedical and social-emotional elements that affect early development and are essential to achieving health equity. The speaker will provide background on the overall project and share information about the various pilot programs being implemented around the state.

#### **Workshop Sessions**

#### **Thursday concurrent sessions:**

#### Visual Diagnosis of the Newborn

This workshop will present over 120 photos of newborns with various cutaneous findings. These range from the common to the very rare and include, infections and genetic causes. Dr.Clark's goal is to help clinicians recognize benign and transient skin findings, as well as understand the genetic associations of neonatal skin, and variations in transplacental infections.

#### **Exclusivity and Disparities among recent refugee & cultural minorities**

This presentation will identify cultural factors that shape exclusivity disparities among diverse social groups and explore possible causes and implications of breastfeeding exclusivity disparities. The speaker will discuss how using birth record data offers useful insights into breastfeeding exclusivity patterns and suggest how reframing cultural opportunities (vs. barriers) for insightful, targeted interventions.

#### Building the Village for PMAD (Perinatal Mood Anxiety Disorder)

Maternal mental health is a national crisis with Perinatal Mood and Anxiety Disorders (PMAD) affecting 1:5 mothers. To mitigate the impact of PMADs on the mother, infant and family, Crouse Health created a *village* to support the mental health of new families during pregnancy and the postpartum period. The speakers will review the assessment, design, implementation and evaluation processes for this initiative and provide suggestions for other institutions to develop the community collaboration needed and replication of the program model.

#### Friday concurrent sessions:

#### What is an obstetric medical home and how do you start one?

Obstetric medical homes are being developed in many states (Texas, North Carolina, Wisconsin, Missouri, Oregon) with the core goals of patient centered care and shared decision making, a proactive focus on health, coordination of multiple services and supports, improving birth outcomes, coordination with pediatricians, and tracking of patients over time including an extended postpartum period. This talk will review the rationale behind the design of our obstetric medical home, what areas we chose to focus on to impact outcomes, as well as preliminary data collected to date for our project.

#### Adoption in the 4th Trimester

This workshop includes case examples, lecture and group discussion, aims to support and educate those working with women and couples considering or planning an adoption at childbirth and beyond. We will discuss the needs, especially in regard to mental and emotional health, of a birth mother in the 4th trimester, and how they both differ and are similar to those of a mother who is parenting their child. There will be examples give of how both birth parents and adoptive parents experience postpartum depression in unique ways. We will explore stages of grief, hope and resiliency, as well as services and supports that are available to all members of the adoption triad in this critical time of healing and bonding.

## Keeping a 'Watchful Eye' Over Mothers and Babies - Research and Best Practices in Prenatal and Perinatal Psychology and Birth and Postpartum Doula Care and Their Impact on Maternal and Infant Health

This workshop will engage participants in an interdisciplinary look at current research in prenatal and perinatal psychology, as well as pregnancy, birth, and postpartum practices. In addition to nursing care, we will look at the influence of birth and postpartum doulas on the health and wellbeing of mothers, babies, and families and integrate current research and innovative options for preventing and treating postpartum mood disorders and postpartum depression. Utilizing a traumainformed perspective, the overall goal will be to increase understanding and improve best practices in community-based maternal and infant health care and services.
